Rural Proofing is a part of good policymaking. Rural areas face particular challenges. Many of these characteristics such as geographic isolation, an ageing population and an economy based on micro enterprises and SMEs are found in other parts of Wales. In rural areas they may be more severe or combine to form a set of circumstances that may hinder the effective implementation of policy.

This screening tool has been developed to help you rural proof your policy. The purpose of rural proofing is to assess the impact your policy may have on rural areas, identify barriers to effective implementation in rural areas and help you to formulate rural appropriate solutions.

Impact assessments are required by Welsh Ministers for all policies. We need to ensure we are taking cross-cutting issues into account and by completing this rural proofing screening tool we are assessing the need for further investigation into completing an impact assessment.

This screening question helps to identify whether your policy is relevant to rural areas. If it has, we will ask you to complete a further, more detailed rural proofing set of questions.
