Q13. If you disagree with the NDF's approaches to green infrastructure, renewable energy or district heat networks, what alternative approaches should we consider to help Wales to enhance its biodiversity and transition to a low carbon economy?

May I begin by saying that I am fully in favour of renewable energy and the need to address climate change I just feel that the approach you propose is not necessarily the right one. It seems that having a huge number of wind farms/solar energy farms is really just to maintain the current position on energy use. I see very little in the proposals which would encourage an overall reduction in energy use. Where are the proposals to get all households in Wales up to a high standard of insulation together with other means of reducing household energy use? Why are there no proposals to fit all Assembly/Local Government buildings plus social housing (where suitable) with solar panels rather than despoiling our countryside. I have seen large scale solar farms in Kent and they are more of a disfigurement on the landscape than wind farms..

Wales is incredibly picturesque, yet the proposals that I see on the map seem to suggest that virtually the whole country apart from the National Parks and AONB's are up for grabs, even areas close by where I live (Newtown) which went through a lengthy public enquiry to have large wind farm developments thrown out. As for the presumption that planning permission would be given unless reasons against it can be provided, that is almost as bad as you are presumed guilty unless you can prove otherwise, it is simply not democratic. There should be a level playing field when it comes to decide on any application.

Then there is the issue of large scale infrastructure criss-crossing Wales to transmit any power generated. I see no proposals for off shore wind farms, why not? Cardiff Bay/Swansea Bay/Cardigan Bay ? The first two would be close to the pylon network that runs along between Swansea and Newport so connection should be more straightforward. Off shore wind farms have a minimal effect on the landscape as they are generally sited far from the coast. From a UK perspective off shore wind farms seem to be going from strength to strength with more coming on stream all the time and yet there seems to be nothing proposed for Wales as far as I can see. Surely this must be preferable to covering large areas of our countryside with turbines/solar panels. Many of the areas illustrated on the map rely on tourism for a lot of local income, that will be put in jeopardy if these large scale developments should ever come to pass.

Becoming Carbon neutral involves a lot more than just finding alternative ways of generating electricity than burning fossil fuels. Restoration of peat bogs on the uplands/ a massive increase in tree planting. <https://www.iwa.wales/click/2018/02/wales-needs-trees-arent-planting/> not enough is being done as be clearly seen by this article.

Let us have some vision from the Welsh Assembly rather than letting private companies cover our land with turbines and solar panels. Those companies will reap the profits and any financial gain to local communities is unlikely to offset the loss of income through tourism.
