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# Introduction



We are the **Independent Commission on the Constitutional Future of Wales.**



We are a team of professionals working together to look at how Wales is run now and how it could be run in the future.



This means which part of government is responsible for what, who makes decisions, and who has the power to change things.



Government includes the UK Government based in London, the Welsh Government in Cardiff, and your local council.



The team is run by Professor Laura McAllister and Dr Rowan Williams.



There are 9 other people on the team. They have different opinions and come from different backgrounds.

We have been set up by Welsh Government to look at:

- Who has power over what in Wales.
- The rules for how Wales is run.
- Who makes the decisions that affect the people of Wales.
- What parts of life should we be able to make our own rules and decisions over.



At the moment, Wales is run as part of the UK. UK Parliament gives some power to Welsh Parliament and Welsh Government. This is called **Devolution**.



**Devolution** means that some powers moved from UK Parliament to Welsh Parliament. It means there are some things we can make our own decisions and laws about. Like health and social care, housing and education.



There are lots of things changing in politics in the UK at the moment.



We are still working out how to deal with **Brexit** – when Britain voted to leave the **European Union**.



The **European Union** is a group of countries whose governments work together. The UK voted to leave this group in 2016. This was nicknamed **Brexit**.



And **devolution** is over 20 years old. It needs to be looked at again to make sure we are run in the best way for the people of Wales.



We are looking at how Wales is run now. And what needs to be improved.



We are going to look at options for how Wales could be run in the future.



We will look at the good and bad points of having more powers. And being more independent.



We want to hear from as many people as possible.



We want to hear from all types of people, from all over Wales.



We want to know what matters to you, and what your hopes are for Wales.

## Questions to help you have a say



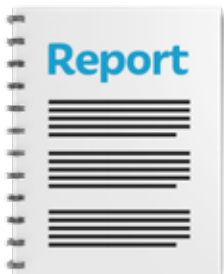
These questions are just to help you think about your answers.

## Questions



1. **What matters to you most about the way Wales is run?**

At the moment, Wales is run by the Welsh Government and the UK Government.

The way Wales is run means which part of government is responsible for what, who makes decisions, and who has the power to change things.



2. **What do you think are the most important things we need to think about?**



3. **At the moment, Wales is run by the Welsh Government and the UK Government. What do you think are the strengths of this? What parts of this system do you think we should keep?**



4. **Are there any problems with the way Wales is run at the moment?**



**5. We are run by 3 types of government. UK Government, Welsh Government and local government – your local council.**

What do you think about the way power is spread across these governments? Who should have more power? Or less?

**6. Thinking about Wales as its own country:**



- Do you like the way Wales is run at the moment? Wales is run as part of the UK. UK Parliament gives some power to Welsh Parliament and Welsh Government.
- Should we have more power and control – with UK Parliament only having power over things that affect the whole of the UK?



- Should Wales have full control to run itself? Should we be separate from the UK?



- Are there any other ways of running the country that you can think of?



- Alongside any of these options, should local councils have more responsibilities? This would mean decisions would be made in your local community. What types of things do you think should be decided like this?

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# Your rights



We follow the data protection laws when dealing with your information. The data protection laws give you the right to:

We also follow a law called **UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR)**.



Our staff will be able to see your answers.



Sometimes we ask other organisations to help us understand people's answers. So, they may see your information too.



We normally publish a report showing the kinds of things people said.



Sometimes this means people's personal details are included. Please tell us if you do not want your personal information included.



If you are in our report the information could be available for a long time.



But information that is not published is only kept for 3 years.
