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# **Key Dates**

#### Introduction

The Well-being of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015 ("the Act") is about improving the social, economic, environmental and cultural well-being of Wales. It gives a legally-binding common purpose – the seven well-being goals – for national government, county and county borough councils, local health boards and other specified public bodies. It details the ways in which specified public bodies must work, and work together, to improve the well-being of Wales.

The Act provides for better decision-making by ensuring that those public bodies take account of the long-term, help to prevent problems occurring or getting worse, take an integrated and collaborative approach, and consider and involve people of all ages. Together, the seven well-being goals and five ways of working provided by the Act are designed to support and deliver a public service that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

In February 2016 the Welsh Government published statutory guidance for public bodies, public services boards and relevant community councils called "Shared Purpose: Shared Future". # **Annual Reporting**

### The Welsh Ministers

The Welsh Ministers must prepare an annual report on the progress they have made towards meeting their well-being objectives. This annual report must be published and laid before the National Assembly for Wales as soon as reasonably practicable following the end of the financial year to which the report relates.

# Other Public bodies (not the Welsh Ministers)

Public bodies are required to report annually on their progress towards meeting their well-being objectives. They must report in respect of each financial year. Financial year is defined as the period of 12 months ending with 31 March. The report must be published as soon as reasonably practicable following the end of the financial year to which the report relates.

For Local Health Boards and NHS Trusts they must report in respect of each accounting year. The term accounting year is used in line with the National Health Service (Wales) Act 2006.

For Natural Resources Wales the annual report, which they are required to prepare by the Natural Resource Body for Wales (Establishment) Order 2012, must also detail the progress made by the body in meeting its well-being objectives.

# Public services boards (annual progress report)

Each public services board must prepare an annual progress report specifying the steps it has taken, since publishing its most recent local well-being plan, to meet the objectives set out in that plan.

Each board must publish its first annual progress report no later than 14 months after the publication of its local well-being plan, and then no later than one year after each subsequent progress report. However, a board does not need to prepare a progress report if a local well-being plan is to be published no later than one year after the publication of the board's previous report.
