Technical Information

Table 1 below provides additional technical information to the indicators laid in the National Assembly for Wales under section 11(1) Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (Wales) Act 2015. All indicators are to be measured at the Wales level.

Note:

The national indicators set out in this document are the first stage indicators. Further development work will take place during 2019-2020 with stakeholders to build upon the indicators, measures and data sources. This is in line with the provision set out in section 11(3) of the Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence (Wales) Act 2015.

Examples of the kind of data and other outcomes frameworks that might provide supporting narrative to these indicators has been referenced under 'Contextual Information'. However, it is not expected that they will all be used at any one time and other data may also be used as contextual information for the indicators.

Where possible, the data may be disaggregated to different areas within Wales. However, not all data will be available to the same geographical level, and the robustness of those data will be dependent on the data sources.

Similarly, where available, data may be disaggregated by the different protected characteristics (as set out in the Equality Act 2010). However, not all data will be available for each of the protected characteristics. The indicators will be analysed where data are robust and appropriate to be used in that context.

The future development work referenced above will also provide further indications of whether or not data can be disaggregated according to local area, equality group and other contextual information that will aid analysis.

The final set of national indicators will be laid before the National Assembly by spring 2020.

Table 1:

The National Violence Against Women, Domestic Abuse and Sexual Violence Indicators have been designed to report progress made towards the implementation of the Act. The VAWDASV National Strategy outlines the six key objectives that Welsh Ministers expect to achieve by November 2021 and are aligned to deliver against the purpose of the Act which is to improve: Arrangements for the **Prevention** of violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence; Arrangements for the **Protection** of victims of violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence; **Support** for people affected by violence against women, domestic abuse and sexual violence.
