# AMENDMENT TO THE HUMAN MEDICINES REGULATIONS 2012 – SUPPLY AND USE OF ADRENALINE AUTO INJECTORS IN SCHOOLS

# **Purpose**

1. To inform you of the introduction of the exemption allowing schools to obtain, hold and use adrenaline auto-injectors in the emergency treatment of anaphylactic reactions.

## **Background**

- 2. Following advice from the Commission on Human Medicines (CHM) the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA) have recommended changes to UK legislation to enable schools to hold adrenaline auto-injectors for use in in treating an emergency anaphylaxis.
- 3. Following agreement by the UK and Welsh Government and other devolved administrations, an amendment to the Human Medicines Regulations (2012) allows schools, from 1 October 2017, to obtain adrenaline auto-injectors, without prescription, for use in the emergency treatment of anaphylactic reactions.
- 4. It is not required that schools hold adrenaline auto-injectors; this is a discretionary power enabling schools to do so, if they so wish.
- 5. An adrenaline auto-injector can be used if the child or young person's prescribed adrenaline auto-injectors are not available, for example because it has misfired. School held adrenaline auto-injectors should only be used by children or young people:
  - who have been diagnosed as being at risk of anaphylaxis, and prescribed an adrenaline autoinjector;
  - for whom parent/carer consent for use of the adrenaline auto-injector has been given; and

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- whose own prescribed adrenaline auto-injector cannot be administered correctly, without delay.
- 6. Schools that choose to keep adrenaline autoinjectors should put in place a policy supporting their appropriate use. Guidance has been developed with the Department for Education and Skills providing advice on content of such policies. This guidance is available at: <a href="https://www.learning.gov.wales">www.learning.gov.wales</a>

#### Action

- 7. Schools should purchase adrenaline auto-injectors from a registered pharmacy. Schools are permitted to buy adrenaline auto-injectors and pharmacies are allowed to supply them provided such supplies represent small quantities, and take place on an occasional basis and are not for profit.
- 8. In requesting a supply, a school must furnish the pharmacy with a request from the school signed by the head-teacher (or acting head-teacher), ideally on appropriately headed school paper, stating:
  - the name of the school for which the product is required;
  - the purpose for which that product is required, and

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- the total quantity required.
- 9. Schools may wish to discuss the different adrenaline auto-injectors available with a pharmacist. Schools may require advice on use of the adrenaline auto-injectors. Schools will be aware that pharmacies will charge for the cost of adrenaline auto-injectors and may add a handling charge.
- 10. In the event a school has reason to utilise an adrenaline auto-injector, they have been advised to ensure used adrenaline auto-injectors are handed to the attending ambulance.
