of care - Karen highlighted the important role that Regional Partnership Boards have in delivering actions around joint planning and commissioning of services. She advised the group of the funding available under the Transformation Fund and the Integrated Care Fund.

Action 13: to improve the take-up and quality of annual health checks - Karen advised that agreement with GPC Wales had been reached on a revised specification for annual health checks which would be offered to all individuals over the age of 14 with a learning disability. Karen also highlighted the check would be offered to everyone and not linked to the severity of learning disability. Karen advised the revised specification would be subject to formal negotiation with GPC Wales as part of the overall negotiations for the new GP contract commencing April 2019.

Next steps:

- Populate the GP practice registers to ensure the annual health check is offered to the learning disability population;
- Raise awareness of the importance of the health check to support increased take-up; and,
- Support GPs at Primary Care Cluster level to ensure good quality annual health checks are undertaken consistently across Wales.

Anna gave a presentation covering: the Timeline; Aims of the Code; Aim of the Consultation; and the 4 key areas of the code. Julie added that an easy read version of the consultation would be available in the New Year and that during the consultation period, meetings would be held with the third sector. 7.2 A discussion followed on the code and whether it met the needs of the estimated 40% of autistic people who also have learning disability.
