

Theme 1: Increasing the number of Welsh speakers



Annual Population Survey: Consistent increase in the number of Welsh speakers over the last decade.



Increase in the number of children attending Cylchoedd Meithrin to over **11,500** children.



Increase in the percentage of learners who sit Welsh as a GCSE subject **17%** as first language and **65%** as second language.



89% of children attending Cylchoedd Meithrin progressed on to Welsh-medium schools.



During 2017/18, **12,680** adults were learning Welsh with the National Centre for Learning Welsh.



As part of the Cymraeg for Kids programme initiative, over **13,000** one-to-one discussions were held with families about Welsh-medium education and the use of Welsh in the home.

Theme 2: Increasing the use of Welsh



The Work Welsh initiative has trained over **2,500** workers in a broad range of workplaces and over



39,397 actively participated and attended Dydd Miwsig Cymru events.



4,000 learners have completed an online course.



96% of people surveyed wanted to learn Welsh as a result of engaging with Dydd Miwsig Cymru.



80% of workers that are able to speak Welsh use the language at work at least sometimes.



The Welsh in Business service has worked with **200** businesses to increase their use of the language.



45,000 community newspapers are circulated each month with over 3,000 volunteers making this possible.

Theme 3: Creating favourable conditions – infrastructure and context



A comprehensive plan was published to develop the language within the IT sector.



Strengthened international relations by celebrating the UNESCO International Year of Indigenous Languages in 2019.
