## RPW Customer Survey

RPW will be issuing a Customer Satisfaction Survey over the summer to give customers the opportunity to express views on RPW online and customer service. 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## BPS 2022 payments

This year, an Advance payment, worth 70% of the anticipated final BPS 2022 claim value, will be made from 14 October 2022, subject to claim eligibility and receipt of all necessary supporting documents. Balance payments will be made from 15 December 2022.

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## Cross Compliance – 2022

The vast majority of Cross Compliance rules continue to apply as in 2021. However some fact sheets have been updated for 2022. This reflects the changes in requirements, good practice and clarifies some of the wording. There have also been some changes to the Cross Compliance 2022 Verifiable Standards for classifying breaches of Good Agricultural and Environmental Conditions (GAEC) and Statutory Management Requirements (SMR). The 2022 changes are:

- SMR 4: food and feed law. Minor changes to clarify wording of requirements.
- SMR 6: pig identification and registration. New guidance on tagging pigs for export included. Contact details updated.
- SMR 7: cattle identification and registration. New guidance on tagging cattle for export included.
- SMR 8: sheep and goat identification. New guidance on tagging sheep and goats for export included. Requirement to retain movement documents updated.
- SMR 10: restrictions on the use of Plant Protection Products (PPP). Clarification of PPP definition and retained EC provisions. Contact details updated.
- GAEC 6: maintenance of soil and organic matter. Link to Environmental Impact Assessment (EIA) guidance updated.

You should regularly check and review the Cross Compliance regulations.

## RPW Online: Manage My County Parish Holding (CPH)

Manage My CPH enables keepers to view and maintain the land included in their CPH and to create or close a CPH online. The new CPH rules provide consistency across all species and improve the ability to respond quickly and effectively in the event of a disease outbreak. The rules require a ten mile distance rule on the movement of all species of livestock; a process for registering temporary land connections and temporary CPHs; and that keepers acquiring land for livestock on a permanent or temporary basis must notify RPW in advance of moving livestock onto the holding in order for the CPH to be updated or for a new CPH/temporary CPH to be allocated.

Over 55% of existing registered keepers have transitioned their CPH and are now benefiting from the new 10 mile rule and functionality of Manage My CPH via RPW Online. Over 27,000 inactive CPH records have been closed.

# RURAL DEVELOPMENT SCHEMES



## Growing for the Environment

The Growing for the Environment scheme supports the growing and utilisation of crops, which can result in improvements in the environmental performance of a farm business.

The scheme objectives are to support farmers to:

- Reduce carbon and greenhouse gas emissions.
- Adapt to climate change and build greater resilience into farm businesses.
- Improve water quality and reduce flood risks.
- Contribute towards a reversal in the decline of Wales' native biodiversity.

The first application window is open and will close on 29 July 2022 with an indicative budget of £350K. This application window is for autumn sown cover crops. A separate Growing for the Environment application window for spring sown crops will open later this year. Further information on the scheme's requirements and eligibility criteria can be found at:

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## Small Grants – Yard Coverings

The Small Grants – Yard Coverings scheme is designed to support farmers in Wales to improve on-farm nutrient management by investing in existing on-farm infrastructure.

Support is provided to separate rainwater and slurry from areas such as livestock feeding and gathering areas, manure storage areas and slurry/silage stores.

The application window for the programme is now open and closes on 5 August 2022, with an indicative budget allocation for this application window of £3m. All interested parties are recommended to read the Small Grants – Yard Coverings rules and guidance document before submitting their full application.

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## Nutrient Management Investment Scheme

The Nutrient Management Investment scheme supports farmers in Wales to improve the economic and environmental performance of their farm businesses.

The objectives are to support investments which enhance on-farm nutrient management, protects and enhances water, soil and air quality, improves on-farm resource efficiencies, technical performance and the use of technology to improve management decisions.

The Expression of Interest window is now open and closes on 12 August 2022. The programme has an indicative budget of £15m. Farm businesses are encouraged to plan and consider what future infrastructure investments are required. 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## Organic Conversion Scheme

The Organic Conversion Scheme is a multi-annual, area-based support scheme available to existing agriculture producers across Wales. The scheme's aim is to provide support to farmers to deliver positive environmental land management. The Organic Conversion Scheme is a 5-year contract funded for the first 2 years.

The Organic Conversion Scheme is only open to those who wish to convert to organic production and meet the eligibility criteria.

The window will open on 18 July and close on 26 August 2022. Please read the Organic Conversion Scheme rules and guidance document before submitting an Expression of Interest, details can be found at:

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## Small Grants – Environment

The Small Grants - Environment is a standalone scheme providing a maximum of £7,500 funding per window for Capital Works Projects. Set lists of Capital Works are available to support the delivery of beneficial environmental outcomes under the following three themes:

- Carbon
- Water
- Landscape & Pollinators.

# WOODLAND SCHEMES

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This year the Welsh Government is introducing a new woodland creation offer to replace the Glastir Woodland Creation Scheme. The Woodland Creation Planning scheme opened on February 28th. It offers grants of between £1,000 and £5,000 to develop plans for new woodland creation. After a plan is successfully verified by Natural Resources Wales, it will be eligible for Welsh Government funding for tree planting. You will be able to make an application at any time in the year, provided that budget is available.

# CONTROL OF AGRICULTURAL POLLUTION REGULATIONS

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The next phase of the Water Resources (Control of Agricultural Pollution) (Wales) Regulations 2021 will apply from 1 January 2023. Important changes coming into force on this date include nutrient management planning requirements and limits on nutrients that can be applied, risk maps, storage requirements for farmyard manure and new requirements for temporary field heaps. The factsheet enclosed with this update provides further information on the changes.

We know every farm is different. That's why Welsh Government and Farming Connect have resources to support you to understand the changes and what they might mean for the management of your holding.

## Preventing disease this summer

Summer is a wonderful time for barbecues, visits to petting zoos and picnics in the wild. However, interactions with animals and wildlife can pose a risk to you and your animals. When out and about this summer, make sure to do this safely, by following some basic steps:

### Interacting with wildlife

Wild animals can carry diseases without any obvious symptoms. Close contact with wildlife or their excrement can spread diseases to people and pets. It is therefore important to enjoy wildlife from a distance.

What you can do to protect yourself and your family this summer:

- Avoid feeding wildlife - Your food may cause harm and the feeding of certain wildlife, including wild boar is illegal.
- Wildlife excrement can carry dangerous diseases – prevent children and pets from playing in contaminated areas.
- Dispose of picnic waste safely and effectively either in bins provided or by taking rubbish home.



- Wash your hands and the hands of young children with soap and water after playing outside, especially in wildlife areas.
- Check yourself and remove any ticks, especially after walking through grasslands.

### Interacting with farm animals

Washing your hands (with soap and running water) immediately after handling farm animals and animals at petting zoos, their supplies or anything in the areas where they live, can go a long way to help prevent illness.

If you keep livestock, look out for signs of disease such as changes in behaviour, feed intake and coordination, and contact APHA on **0300 303 8268** if you suspect a notifiable disease. Consult your vet if you have any concerns about your animals.





## Protecting your pets against disease

Protecting your pets against disease will also keep you and your family healthy. Remember to:

- Vaccinate your pets according to the plan advised by your vet.
- Use recommended veterinary flea, tick, and parasite preventative medications and ensure you check for ticks after each walk.
- Keep your pet away from wild animals that may carry diseases by keeping them close to you and on a lead.
- Be a responsible animal owner and keep dogs to a short lead and under control when around livestock, and pick up their poo and dispose of it correctly.
- Ensure your pet has been wiped over after walking – especially from mud or soil that could contain bacteria, viruses or parasites from other animals.

If you keep birds of any kind, please make sure you are aware of the latest Avian Influenza disease measures in place, by checking: [www.gov.wales/birdflu](http://www.gov.wales/birdflu)

Always observe good biosecurity measures when tending to your birds and aim to prevent wild bird access to their feed and drinking water.



## What are you bringing back from your travels?

As international travel is restoring back to its pre-pandemic levels, there is a growing risk of travellers and their pets bringing back animal diseases which are not usually present in the UK.

### Adopting / buying pets from abroad

There are a number of disease risks to be aware of when considering adopting or buying a pet from overseas. Rabies and tapeworm, along with tick borne diseases, all of which can be transmittable to humans, pose the greatest risk.

All pets coming from abroad to the UK will need to be vaccinated against rabies and treated for tapeworm, with official documentation of this. Additional travel entry requirements to the UK can be found below.

Please also note that Welsh Government, alongside the UK and Scottish Governments, have temporarily banned all commercial imports from Ukraine, Belarus, Romania and Poland. This decision is based on the serious health risks to humans and animals from some imports of commercial cats, dogs and ferrets from countries with high prevalence of rabies.

If you are looking to adopt or buy a pet from abroad, we ask you to be vigilant when interacting with anyone trying to sell animals from these countries and ensure you are being fully compliant with the law and UK entry requirements.





## Travelling with your pet

If you are travelling abroad with your pet, please ensure you familiarise yourself with the entry requirements of your destination and follow the UK Government guidance.

The table below highlights the travel requirements for pets traveling to the UK from both EU/listed countries (parts 1 and 2) and non-EU unlisted countries. A list of all listed countries is available at: [www.gov.uk](http://www.gov.uk)

## **Animal Health & Welfare workshops...helping you improve the health of your stock**

As Covid 19 restrictions lift many vet practices are returning to delivering face to face Farming Connect funded AH&W workshops to their farmers. Farming Connect registered farmers can receive free training on various animal health topics from approved farm vets. Delivered by participating veterinary practices throughout Wales, the content for each interactive workshop has been written by the National Animal Disease Information Service (NADIS) and accredited by Lantra Awards.

- ✓ Fully funded animal health workshops – delivered face to face or via webinar
- ✓ Interactive sessions with experienced vets
- ✓ Learn to identify, manage, and control numerous animal health issues
- ✓ Discuss treatment and potential preventative measures
- ✓ Opportunity for farmer to farmer learning and discussion.

New modules have been created this year and added to the collection of topics available for vets to deliver. There are now a total of 18 workshops available to enhance farmer understanding of various animal health issues. Workshops for the most recent additions to the collection are now being delivered to farmers, these latest topics are:

- Improving post-weaning lamb performance
- Maximising suckler cow productivity
- Parasite control in cattle
- Flock fertility management.

The launch of these new modules has coincided with their seasonal significance. This will allow many sheep farmers over the coming months to benefit from advice on finishing lambs efficiently, dealing with issues of poor performance in weaned lambs and preparing for the tuppung season in good time to avoid many common problems often encountered.

Cattle farmers will also benefit from advice on parasite control to improve health and reduce unnecessary use of anthelmintics, whilst suckler farmers will be advised on ways to improve herd productivity.

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## **African Swine Fever (ASF)**

Although the disease has never been reported in the UK, ASF has continued to spread across Europe and Asia recently, damaging the pig industry in affected countries and leading to the deaths of millions of kept and wild pigs and boar. The most likely transmission route to UK domestic pigs would be via infected meat imported from a country affected by ASF.

To prevent ASF from reaching and spreading in the UK, DO NOT bring pig meat or pork products into the UK from abroad. Make sure you familiarise yourself with UK border restrictions on personal imports and avoid interactions with wild boar and feral pigs when travelling to countries with ASF.

If you keep pigs, make sure to read the Deep-Dive article in this booklet on how to protect your herd from ASF.

### **African Swine Fever: A Deep-Dive**

#### **What is African Swine Fever?**

ASF is a highly contagious notifiable disease which affects kept and wild pigs and boar. Most pigs that become infected will die and there is currently no vaccine or treatment. Humans cannot be infected.





## Global situation

ASF has been spreading across Europe and Asia in recent years, with more than 50 countries having been affected to date. This has led to the deaths of millions of kept and wild pigs and boar, consequently damaging the pig industry in affected countries, and causing a rise in global pork prices.

The disease has never been reported in the UK, however, the continued spread in continental Europe means there is a risk of it entering the country via imports. If ASF were to reach the UK, it would have serious consequences for our pig industry. The risk of ASF incursion to the UK is currently assessed as 'Medium'.

## How can you help to prevent ASF from reaching and spreading in the UK?

- Practice **STRICT** biosecurity on your premises. ASF can survive on clothes, boots, wheels, and other materials due to its high survivability in the environment.
- **DO NOT** feed kitchen or catering waste, especially pork or pork products, to pigs, boar or any livestock. **This practice is illegal.**
- **DO NOT** bring pig meat or pork products into the UK from abroad. It is illegal to bring such products with you from African and Asian countries.
- Avoid hunting in ASF-affected areas.

## How is it transmitted?

- Pigs and boars eating infectious meat or meat products. The virus can survive for a long time in cooked or frozen meat.
- Contact with infected pigs, their faeces, or bodily fluids.
- Contact with anything contaminated with the virus - such as people, clothing, vehicles and other equipment

## What are the symptoms of ASF?

- High temperature
- Diarrhoea
- Discoloured skin
- Coughing

## What to do if you suspect ASF?

ASF is a **notifiable** disease. Therefore, if you suspect ASF it is a legal requirement to report it to your local Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) office on **0300 303 8268**.

# KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE ON FARM DURING THE SUMMER HOLIDAYS

1. Children should not be allowed in the farm work place (and for young children they should enjoy outdoor space in a secure fenced area).
2. Any access to the work area by children under 16, for example for education, or knowledge experience, should be planned and fully supervised by an adult not engaged in any work activity.
3. Children under the age of 13 years are specifically prohibited from driving or riding on any agricultural machine.
