Details:

The Rompney Castle is a 150 year old historic local landmark in the village of Rumney within Cardiff, It is currently at threat of being demolished by a private developer.

This Historic pub (formerly the Pear Tree) has been at the heart of the Rumney community for over 150 years and was known as a pirate hideout for smugglers who used the local Rhymney River to travel to it. Glamorgan Historic Society has concerns that it may also sit next to a historic road that once ran through the area with potential for many archaeological finds within the grounds. This property was recently sold by Brains to a private developer who is now submitting plans to demolish the pub and the grounds to build a block of flats that will destroy any historic detail that the site contains and will also destroy a part of east Cardiff's smuggling/pirate history. It is even said that Captain Henry Morgan regularly used this building along with the local Llanrumney Hall and rumours of tunnels linking these two buildings with the river. With such a wealth of history known and undiscovered still yet to be found on this site i think it would be suitable to become a

listed building protecting a 150-year-old local landmark and preserving the centre of a Historic village alongside other historic landmarks such as the 12th century St Augustine's church just a few roads away. The building has gathered over 500 signatures in a petition to protect it from demolition and shows how much this means to the local community.
