- 1. The scope of the project and the areas of Wales it covers.
- 2. Which Local Authorities are working on this project.
- 3. How many FTE members of staff have worked on this project by year over 3 years.
- 4. What budget has been allocated by the Welsh Government for this project by year.
- 5. The measurable objectives for the project.
- 6. The results/progress against these objectives by year.
- 7. Whether the budget has been exceeded by any Local Authority.
- 8. Who has overall responsibility for this project within the Welsh government.
- 9. Details of the training/qualifications that are required for a Local Authority enforcement officer, specifically relating to animal licensing.

Our response

The information you requested is enclosed.

- 1. In relation to the scope of the project and the areas of Wales it covers, the project which ran from June 2020 to March 2023 aimed to:
 - Ensure all breeding dogs and their puppies have good health and welfare and a good quality of life.
 - Ensure that puppies receive adequate enrichment and socialisation programmes to help equip them with the social and behavioural skills necessary to adapt to a home environment and live a good quality of life in the future.
 - Implement a new model that will afford protection to legitimate breeders, enable the identification of illegal breeders, and promote a fair-trading environment by:
 - o Requiring all breeders to be either licensed or registered.
 - Implementing a robust inspection procedure and consistent enforcement, and
 - o Developing an intelligence capability to support enforcement work.
 - As well as a regional investigation team, the funding provided an online information system, intelligence reporting, education and campaigns, the standardising of documentation and inspections across Local Authorities

- in Wales, training for all Local Authorities in Wales and the introduction of a level 3 qualification for inspection officers.
- The project was led by Monmouthshire County Council, on behalf of Trading Standards Wales and covered Local Authorities pan Wales.
- 2. In relation to which Local Authorities are working on this project, please see the above.
- 3. In relation to how many FTE staff worked on the project each year over the 3 years, we do not hold this breakdown however 11 regional enforcement officers, 2 support officers and 2 system co-ordinators have been trained and taken up posts.
- 4. In relation to the budget allocated by Welsh Government:
 - 2020-2021 £92,000.00
 - 2021-2022 £567,000.00
 - 2022-2023 £567,000.00
- 5. In relation to the measurable objectives of the project, please see annex 1 at the end of this document.
- 6. In relation to the results/progress against the objectives, please see annex 1 at the end of this document.
- 7. In relation to whether the budget has been exceeded, the project ran within budget and did not exceed the allocated amount.
- 8. In relation to who has overall responsibility of the project within Welsh Government, the project is managed by the Office of the Chief Veterinary Officer.
- 9. In relation to details of the training/qualifications that are required for a Local Authority enforcement officer, no information is held. We don't hold this information as there has been no such appointments by Welsh Government. We have a monitoring role in relation to the grant management of the project but have no role in relation to how recruitment and training programmes are structured. The project has however introduced a level 3 qualification for inspection officers.
