Thank you for your request for information dated 30 November 2023.

Your request:

You asked for the following information relating to the Acquisition of Cardiff Airport:

- 1. Monies paid initially. Additional monies provided by the Welsh government since acquisition. Detail of loans written off. Current/ongoing funding.
- 2. Forward strategy and rationale as to why the Welsh government are continuing to Support a loss making business. Why are there so few daily flights? Is this part of your 'green' agenda?

Our Response:

1. Monies paid initially. Additional monies provided by the Welsh government since acquisition. Detail of loans written off. Current/ongoing funding:

Since 2013, the Welsh Government has invested the following in the Airport:

Acquisition and Equity Investment:	£67.9m
Loans	£69.8m ¹
Grants	£38.9m
TOTAL investment to date:	£176.6m

Acquisition and Equity Investments:

The airport was purchased for £52m in 2013. At the point of acquisition, an equity investment of £3.3m was also made.

In 2018, the Welsh Government made an equity investment of £6m.

On 26 October, the Welsh Government made a further equity investment of £6.6m; Written Statement: Cardiff Airport Next Generation Security (NGS) Scanners (26 October 2023) | GOV.WALES

Grants:

In 2016, the Welsh Government provided grant funding of £169k to support the airport's safety and security.

In 2019, the Welsh Government grant funded the replacement of e-Passport Gates at a cost of £523k.

¹ Includes total accrued interest of £10.4m as at 6 May 2021.

In March 2021, the Welsh Government agreed a Rescue and Restructuring Plan grant of £42.6m. £38.2m of this funding has been drawn down to date with the balance to be drawn down by the end of December 2024.

At the same time as the award of the £42.6m rescue and recovery grant package, WG wrote off £42.6m of CIAL's £69.8m total commercial loan debt (including accrued interest). The remaining outstanding debt following the write off was £27.2m as at 6 May 2021.

2. Forward strategy and rationale as to why the Welsh government are continuing to Support a loss making business. Why are there so few daily flights? Is this part of your 'green' agenda?
