Quantitative survey method

Main objectives

- Explore levels of understanding of how Wales is run currently
- Explore perceptions of how Wales is run currently
- Explore how participants would like to see Wales run in the future

Approach

- Quantitative survey to gather views of a **robust**, **representative** sample of the Welsh public
- 1,596 interviews in total, conducted 18 May to 9 June 2023
 - 1,500 from online self-completion panel survey of adults 16+ across Wales
 - Boost of 96 telephone interviews with digitally excluded people (not used internet in last 3 months)
- Data weighted to fine tune representation by age, gender, social grade and region using Census proportions




Interest in and knowledge of how Wales is run





8 in 10 of the public are interested in how Wales is run, but fewer than half that proportion feel they know much about it




73% agree "You don't see or hear enough about how Wales is run in the media"



Younger people are less interested and less knowledgeable than older age groups; middle classes (ABC1s) are more interested and knowledgeable than the working classes (C2DEs)



Fewer than half feel they have seen or heard much about how Wales is run in the last 12 months; no improvement over the last 10 years





TV news is main source of news and information generally for people in Wales, followed by online news websites and social media; there are marked differences by age group

Even where the public correctly identified powers as being devolved, a sizeable minority got it wrong, particularly for welfare and benefits, health and justice




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Views on the current situation



Just over half of the public think the current system of government in Wales works well, while just over 4 in 10 think the opposite

Q. How well do you think the current system of government in Wales works? (%)






Reasons for a positive rating focused around policy areas, services and performance. Mentions of constitutional structure / change at a much lower level






Those who think current system is not working well also mainly focus on policy areas and services; but they also mention the general economic situation

Q. Overall, do you think that devolution has been good for Wales? (%)






Proportions thinking Wales has a stronger voice in the UK with the Senedd / WG are similar to those feeling devolution has benefited Wales

Welsh Government since devolution has given Wales...? (%)







Q. How satisfied are you with how effectively each of the following is doing its job? *(Mean score: 10 = extremely satisfied, 0 = extremely dissatisfied)*



Trust is considerably higher in Senedd / Welsh Government to do what's best for Wales than in UK Parliament / Government


Q. To what extent, if any, do you trust...to do what's best for Wales?



> "I would feel happier knowing that Wales had these powers. At the moment it feels like Wales has no control in important policies like policing, as Wales has different needs… I think that these kinds of policies should be devolved"

Q. Would you like to see changes made to how Wales is run in future? By that we mean the structures in place for how decisions are made and put into practice, not the political parties in power. (%)











Commission interim report – three possible options for Wales' future

Before being presented with the Commission's three possible options, survey respondents were given this explanation:

The Welsh Government has set up an Independent Commission on the Constitutional Future of Wales.

They are looking at how Wales is run now and how it could be run in the future, including:

- Who has power over what in Wales
- The rules for how Wales is run
- Who makes decisions that affect the people of Wales
- What parts of life Wales should be able to make its own rules and decisions on
- New ideas for how all this can be improved

They have issued an interim report, with three possible options for how Wales is run in the future and they would like to know what people think about each of these. Q. Which of the three options below, if any, would be your preference?


If you don't agree with any of the options you can suggest something else (which could include leaving things as they are) or select 'none of these'.

- Devolution: strengthened and secured This means making sure that the powers Wales has to make its own decisions cannot be taken away by the UK Government. It could also mean extending the responsibilities that Wales has - for example to include the justice system and policing.
- A federal structure This means political change across the whole of the UK with a written constitution setting out the role and responsibilities of each level of government, including devolved bodies within England (similar to how the USA is governed). The UK Government would be responsible only for UK-wide policies like defence and overall economic policy. England would have its own Parliament or possibly separate parliaments for different regions of England.
- Independence This means Wales becoming an independent country. Wales would make all its own rules and laws and collect taxes and manage its own money. Wales would take responsibility for all financial matters and would not rely on UK Government support.

Q. Which of the three options below, if any, would be your preference? (%)



Those identifying as Welsh not British most likely to opt for Independence. Those identifying as British not Welsh or More British than Welsh were most likely to reject all three options


Q. Which of the three options below, if any, would be your preference? (%)

Interest in and knowledge of how Wales is run

- 8 in 10 of the public are interested in how Wales is run, but fewer than half that proportion feel they know much about it.
- Younger people are less interested and less knowledgeable than the older age groups; the middle classes (ABC1s) are more interested and knowledgeable than the working classes (C2DEs).
- Fewer than half feel they have seen or heard much about how Wales is run in the last 12 months; there seems to have been no improvement on this measure over the last 10 years.
- TV news is the main source of news and information generally for people in Wales, followed by online news websites and social media. Marked differences are apparent by age social media is the main information channel for 16-34s, while TV news is the main channel for the over 55s.
- While the public can correctly identify most of the areas controlled by the Senedd / Welsh Government, there is confusion over who is responsible for some areas (policing, renewable energy, broadcasting and media regulation). Even where the majority correctly identified powers as devolved, a sizeable minority got it wrong, especially on welfare and benefits, and health.
- Comparing results with 10 years ago, there seems to have been little improvement in public knowledge of which powers are devolved to Wales.



Summary

Views on the current situation

- Around half of the public think the current system of government in Wales works well, while just over 4 in 10 think the opposite.
- 4 in 10 think devolution has been good for Wales, twice as many as think the reverse, but 3 in 10 don't see any difference.
- Satisfaction in Wales is considerably higher with the performance of the Senedd / Welsh Government than that of the UK Parliament / Government, but the scores given don't demonstrate a great deal of confidence.
 - Younger people are more satisfied with the performance of the Senedd / Welsh Government than older people.
 - Conservative supporters are the only group rating the performance of the UK Government / Parliament higher than that of the Senedd / Welsh Government.
- Trust is considerably higher in the Senedd / Welsh Government to do what's best for Wales than in the UK Parliament / Government.
- Bearing in mind there is still confusion about which powers are held by the Senedd / Welsh Government, about 4 in 10 are happy with the status quo, while a similar proportion think Wales has control over too few areas; twice as many as think it has too many powers.

- When presented with the Commission's three options, the highest proportion opted for Devolution: strengthened and secured, followed by a Federal structure, then Independence.
 - Those identifying as Welsh not British were most likely to opt for Independence, while those identifying as British not Welsh or more British than Welsh were most likely to reject all three options.
 - Again, where people live has less of an impact on views than their age, party support and national identity.
