Request for Information - ATISN 20288

Thank you for your request for information dated 29 February.

Information requested

Regarding the 50 mph speed limit on the M4 motorway between Port Talbot and Swansea, which has been justified publicly on signs along the motorway with the intention of improving air quality –

- 1. What scientific evidence is the Welsh Government relying upon that clearly demonstrates a reduction in speed limits to 50 mph is an effective method of improving air quality along the specified section of the M4 motorway?
- 2. Given that this reduced speed limit frequently causes long traffic jams, which might offset any potential benefits to air quality, what evidence does the Welsh Government have to show that this is not the case for this section of the M4 motorway?
- 3. How was the decision made to reduce the speed limit to 50 mph on this section of the M4 motorway? Please provide details of the decision-making process, including any alternative factors or motivations behind this decision.
- 4. How much money is generated on average from speeding fines due to the average speed check enforcement in this section of the M4 motorway and was this a factor in the decision making process?

1. The evidence base used to derive the potential benefits of reducing the speed limit at this location is based on the following:

Effectiveness Review;

M4 Port Talbot J41 to J42 WelTAG Stage One Report;
M4 Port Talbot J41 to J42 WelTAG Stage Two Report; and
M4 Port Talbot J41 to J42 WelTAG Stage Three Report

- 2. We do not hold any data indicating that the reduced speed limit has led to an increase in traffic congestion in this area.
- Consultants were engaged by Welsh Government to undertake an independent appraisal of measures that had the potential to improve air quality alongside the motorway. Measures were assessed against the following criteria:
 - a) will achieve compliance with the nitrogen dioxide limit as soon as possible;
 - b) will do so in a way that reduces exposure to nitrogen dioxide as quickly as possible; and
- c) will mean that achieving compliance is not just possible but likely. Information on the process is available on the Welsh Government website:
 - Consultation on draft air quality plan and initial appraisals of measures
 - Consultation on final air quality plan and appraisals of measures
 - <u>Decision</u> of the Cabinet Secretary for Economy & Transport to continue the 50mph speed limits to achieve compliance with limit values for nitrogen dioxide laid down in the Ambient Air Quality Directive (17 December 2018)
 - 4. We do not hold speed enforcement revenue information. This information is held by GoSafe who can be contacted at General Enquiries | GoSafe Welsh Road Casualty Reduction Partnership.
