## Organisations who have been awarded funding





### Aberporth Community Council

-  1 year

This project will empower young people in Aberporth and Parcllyn to co-design elements of the newly acquired Parcllyn sports and community field, using workshops and engagement sessions to learn about local democracy and participate in real decision-making. Through partnership working, the initiative will create inclusive, youth-led recreational spaces while fostering democratic awareness, community ownership, and intergenerational connection.





### Boys & Girls Club Wales

Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Wales will expand its successful Pizza and Politics and Raise Your Voice initiatives to engage young people furthest from democratic participation. The project will build political literacy, boost voter registration, and create opportunities for youth-led engagement and dialogue with elected representatives.



### Foothold Cymru

Future Changemaker Cafés will help 14-18 year-olds in Carmarthenshire, especially from disadvantaged backgrounds, gain political knowledge and confidence through inclusive, bilingual weekly sessions. The project aims to empower them to take part in local democracy, create civic projects, and make their voices heard by decision-makers.

### KIDCARE4U

This two-part project aims to raise awareness of democratic rights among people from diverse ethnic communities in Newport, with a particular focus on women and children who face language and IT barriers. The first part of the project will support adults to better understand their rights, responsibilities, and how democratic processes affect their everyday lives ranging from issues like bin collections to the duties of local authorities and their right to request services. The second part will engage children to build their understanding of democracy from an early age. Activities will be delivered across different settings within our organisation, ensuring accessible and inclusive learning for all participants.

### Learning Disability Wales

Over the term of our Democratic Engagement Grant, we'll be starting three new groups and inviting local politicians from the council, Senedd and Westminster to attend the meetings. We operate nationally across Wales and our new groups will be in Gwynedd, Pontypridd and Swansea. We'll also be improving democratic engagement across our existing community groups, based mostly in South Wales.

ScoutsCymru will give young people across Wales the tools, skills, and confidence to run local hustings and take part in a fun, hands-on Welsh Youth Parliament experience, bringing democracy to life in an exciting and meaningful way.





### Shout Out UK

Over the next two years, Shout Out UK (SOUK) will be delivering political and media literacy workshops to a minimum of 2,400 young people aged 14-18 in Wales. These workshops, primarily targeting rural communities, aim to equip students with the skills to understand democratic processes, identify misinformation, combat online hate, and increase their participation in upcoming elections, specifically the 2026 Senedd and 2027 Local Government elections. All project materials will be available in Welsh to ensure accessibility and alignment with the Welsh curriculum.

### South Riverside Development Centre

The aim of our project is to support the democratic engagement of foreign nationals in Cardiff, specifically those using English as a second language. We will seek to increase understanding and awareness of the democratic system in Wales, in the run up to the next elections, via the creation of teaching materials for adult English learners as well as through the provision of interpreters for community public awareness workshops.

### Swansea Mosque and Islamic Community Centre

Digital Dialogue: Wales, delivered by The Politics Project, supports meaningful, informed conversations between young people and their elected representatives. Teachers are provided with training and resources to prepare their young people to have the knowledge, skills and confidence to engage in the democratic process through Dialogue sessions, both online and in person, arranged and facilitated by The Politics Project's team.

The programme empowers learners across Wales to become ethical, informed citizens – in line with the Curriculum for Wales and the Well-being of Future Generations Act.
