Hello,

I'm writing to request clarification regarding erroneous listing information relating to the Llanover estate, Monmouthshire, specifically the details in [Ref 87170](#) of the Porth Gwenynen lodge described as 'Lodge to Llanover Park at Tyr Ardd entrance', 'Set by the southern wall of Llanover Park'.

This is identified as a listed building (Grade II), however the description simply duplicates that of another listed GII asset nearby, 'Lodge by Tyr Ardd at Ty-uchaf', listed at [Ref 87169](#). The latter building is in fact the Gardener's Cottage (evident from the name), next to the Kitchen Garden, while the former is the lodge located at the gate in the park wall onto Hanover Road. The listing information for Tyr Ardd wrongly states its location as: 'In the centre of Llanover Park on the east side of the A4052 and approached via Porth-y-pentre' (even the number of the A-road is wrong - it should be A4042), when it is accessed via the same gate from Hanover Road as Porth Gwenynen, on the east edge of the park.

The descriptions for both are identical, and refer to Tyr Ardd, not Porth Gwenynen:

History

Picturesque early C19 lodge probably built as a part of the Llanover Park building programme 1828-37 for Benjamin Hall. Service wing added in early C20 and there has been little alteration since.

Exterior

Built of pennant sandstone semi-ashlar with stone slate roof. L-shaped plan with additional small wing. Picturesque Tudor style. Single storey and attic. The drive elevation has two bays, with a gabled porch to the left and a 2-light diamond lattice window to the right. Small 2-light dormer in roof. Left return has a 2-light window with a single light one above, behind this a picturesquely expressed chimney stack. Right return has a small canted bay with a 2-light window above. Weatherboarded extension to rear typical of those added to most of the Llanover Estate cottages in the early C20 to house laundry, coal store and privy.

I would be grateful for any information as to how this has occurred and what the correct entry should be for Ref 87170.
