# SUSTAINABLE FARMING SCHEME

## Overview

The Universal Layer of the Sustainable Farming Scheme started on 1 January. If you can meet the eligibility criteria, scheme requirements and Universal Actions applicable for your holding, you will be able to enter the scheme.

You can notify us whether you are claiming the SFS, or the Basic Payment Scheme on your Single Application Form (SAF). You do not need to notify us before the SAF if you wish to join the SFS.

SAF 2026 will be open between 2 March and 15 May, and we encourage you to make sure you are aware of the Universal Actions which might apply to you, and when they need to be undertaken throughout the year. The SFS Map available on RPW Online will show the habitat, woodland and other relevant information applicable to your farm.

For those farmers who wish to build upon the Universal Layer, and undertake additional Optional and Collaborative Actions, we will shortly be publishing further information on which actions will be available throughout 2026.

## Universal Actions and other scheme requirements

There are 12 Universal Actions (UAs) for all farmers to complete to meet the requirements of the scheme, however some UAs may not apply to every farm. For example, arable farms with no livestock will not need to undertake UA12 Animal health and welfare. Of the UAs that do apply to you, you may already be undertaking some of them, for example many farmers are already undertaking soil testing, benchmarking or maintaining habitats in line with the requirements.



These UAs are designed to benefit the economic and environmental performance of your farm. Some actions are specific to certain times of the year, and some can be undertaken at any time. We do not expect you to do everything at once.

We encourage you to spread the actions out, rather than leave them all until the end of the year, which may cause a delay to your payments. These actions will provide the most value when integrated as part of your ongoing farm management.

### **There are some UAs you can start now:**

UA3 Benchmarking is designed to help you monitor performance of your livestock, crops and other elements of the farm business. If you choose to carry out your Benchmarking through Farming Connect, the FARMDATA+ tool is available from 1 April.

UA4 Continuous Professional Development (CPD) is designed to help you build on your existing skills and knowledge with additional learning. You can choose different learning providers, and different forms of

learning. If you choose to undertake some or all of your learning through Farming Connect online learning modules you can begin now.

UA5 Habitat maintenance – plan your seasonal grazing patterns to meet the requirements of the different habitat types.

UA6 Temporary habitat creation – if you don't have enough existing habitat, you need to think about which temporary habitats you are going to create to meet the scheme requirement for at least 10% of your farm to be maintained as habitat. The different habitat creation types have different seasonal establishment dates. You will need to confirm which habitats you will be creating on your SAF, and those habitats must be established by the specified dates.

## **Single Application Form 2026**

The Single Application Form (SAF) 2026 is available on RPW Online from 2 March. To complete your SAF, you will need to choose whether you are claiming the Universal Layer of the Sustainable Farming Scheme, or the Basic Payment Scheme on a tapered payment rate. You cannot claim SFS and BPS on the same farm.

If you claim SFS in 2026, you will not be able to claim BPS in future years. If you claim BPS in 2026, you will still be able to claim SFS in 2027, should you wish to do so.

We encourage you to complete your SAF as early as possible, especially

if you are claiming SFS, as there will be additional information required. For example, you will need to confirm your habitat and tree canopy areas using the Habitat Baseline Review within the SAF. By updating this information, the SAF will be able to confirm if you have sufficient habitat to meet the scheme requirement for at least 10% of your farm to be maintained as habitat.

If you do not have enough habitat to meet the requirement, you can declare any eligible hedgerows you may wish to use to help reach the 10%. If you still do not have enough habitat, you will be able to choose from a list of temporary habitat types which can be created within the scheme year. Your SFS map is also available on RPW Online to help you understand the broad habitat classification, landscape features and other important land-based information relevant to your farm.

After you submit your SAF, you will receive a message which includes a copy of your application. It will also include a summary of all the Universal Actions applicable to your farming business.

By starting your SAF early, there should be enough time if you need to raise any queries or clarify any of the scheme requirements.

The deadline for submitting your SAF is midnight 15 May 2026, or by 9 June 2026 with late submission penalties. We will not accept a SAF submitted after midnight on 9 June 2026.

You can access your SAF and SFS map on RPW Online.

## Manage My Land

If you intend to enter the SFS on the SAF 2026, and you need to make any changes to land parcels, such as amending boundaries, splitting/merging parcels or adding, removing or amending permanent features, you will need to submit a Manage My Land request on RPW Online before you make any amendments to those land parcels in the Field Data Section of the SAF. We encourage you to review the SFS Map as soon as possible for any changes that may be required.

## SFS checklist

- ✔ Check your SFS Map on RPW Online for accuracy and to identify which land based Universal Actions might be applicable to you.
- ✔ Notify RPW of any land detail changes via Manage My Land before submitting your SAF.
- ✔ Complete your SAF as early as possible before the 15 May deadline.
- ✔ Start planning how you will meet your Universal Actions, especially if you need to create additional temporary habitat to meet the habitat scheme requirement.
- ✔ Complete the RPW Online transition from Government Gateway to GOV.UK One login in readiness for the SFS.



## Responsibilities when complying with SFS UA4 CPD

This note sets out your responsibilities for meeting UA4 CPD requirements for the 2026 scheme year and beyond.

### Required Actions

- ✓ You must complete a minimum of **6 hours of eligible CPD** by **31 December 2026** including a mandatory Health and Safety training module
- ✓ **CPD is mandatory for every SFS applicant.**

## Using Farming Connect Learning

If you undertake your CPD through Farming Connect, your learning will be automatically recorded on your **Storfa Sgiliau account**, and **no additional evidence** is required for inspection.

Eligible Farming Connect activities include:

- ✓ discussion groups
- ✓ animal health and welfare workshops
- ✓ accredited training
- ✓ mentoring
- ✓ masterclasses
- ✓ Agri Academy
- ✓ Agrisgôp
- ✓ SFS related e-learning (special rules for 2026).

If you're unsure whether the learning you have undertaken qualifies, please check with your local Farming Connect Development Officer or the Service Centre.

## Special Rules for 2026 Only

- ✓ **SFS related e-learning (excluding proficiency training completed from July 2025 counts toward UA4 for 2026 only.**
- ✓ From 2027 onward, e-learning only counts if completed **within that calendar year.**

Some **Animal Health and Welfare proficiency training** may count toward both **UA4 and UA12**, depending on the individual's role. As part of UA12: Animal health and welfare – you are asked to undertake two hours of proficiency training at least every five years. If the person who undertakes the training is a business owner or partner (as registered with RPW), the two hours of training can count towards the required six hours of CPD within the year the learning takes place. Learning by an employee who is not a business owner or partner would not count towards the required six hours.



## Using external learning (not delivered through Farming Connect)

Learning undertaken through external providers will not be automatically recorded on your Storfa Sgiliau account/the Universal Dashboard, and evidence must be retained for inspection (see record keeping below).

External learning is accepted if it meets *all of* the following:

1. Supports **at least one** Sustainable Land Management (SLM) objective.
2. Has **clear learning outcomes**.
3. Includes an **assessment** (formal, verbal, or interactive).
4. Provides **proof of attendance**, including the duration of training and SLM objective covered.

Accepted formats include:

- ✓ e-learning
- ✓ accredited courses
- ✓ discussion groups
- ✓ masterclasses
- ✓ mentoring, and
- ✓ animal health and welfare workshops.

Attendance at conferences, roadshows and general meetings will not be accepted. Where there is an event with a structured session or discussion group that meets the criteria above, these can be considered provided evidence of participation and learning is retained.

## Recordkeeping responsibilities

If you use external providers, you must keep evidence **on farm for 5 years** and provide it at inspection if requested. Required evidence includes:

- ✓ course title
- ✓ date of training
- ✓ hours of learning
- ✓ SLM objective(s) covered
- ✓ name of the participant (if not yourself).

You must record these details on your SFS Dashboard by **15 January 2027** to comply with SFS 2026.

### A Simple Rule of Thumb

Your CPD is compliant if it:


- ✓ has structured learning
- ✓ has clear learning outcomes
- ✓ has an element of testing learning
- ✓ provides a certificate or attendance record
- ✓ contributes to at least one SLM objective.

If any of these are missing, it is unlikely to qualify.

# RURAL PAYMENTS WALES



## Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) Transition Period

The BPS Transition Period began on 1 January 2026, with the introduction of the Sustainable Farming Scheme (SFS).

Farmers will have the option to claim for BPS or SFS on the Single Application Form (SAF) 2026, which will be available 2 March 2026. Once a farm business claims SFS, they cannot claim BPS again.

There are no changes to eligibility criteria and scheme rules during this transition period, however BPS payments will taper over the next

3 years, based on the BPS 2025 entitlement values, as follows:

- ✓ 60% in 2026
- ✓ 40% in 2027
- ✓ 20% in 2028.

There will be no BPS available in 2029.

2025 was the final year for the National Reserve and 2-year entitlement usage rule.

Young Farmer Payments will not be available to new claimants in 2026.

## **BPS transfer and lease of entitlements for 2026**

The transfer of BPS entitlements is restricted to those who transfer and/or lease entitlements with land only for 2026 onwards. In cases of inheritance and succession this means BPS entitlements can only be transferred with land.

## **Independent Appeals Process for Rural Grants and Payments – appeal fee**

From 1 January 2026 the fee charged to submit a Stage 2 appeal increased to cover the costs of the Independent Appeal Panel.



The revised appeal fees apply to all Stage 2 appeals submitted from this date, except for those related to TB compensation.

## **RPW Online – migrating from Government Gateway to GOV.UK One Login**

The delivery and administration of Sustainable Farming Scheme in 2026 is dependent on GOV.UK One Login.

RPW Online is replacing the Government Gateway service with the new GOV.UK One Login service.

All RPW Online customers have now been invited to migrate from Government Gateway to One Login. Support is available from our Customer Contact Centre, from the Farm Liaison Service and from Farming Connect to assist in the migration process. We would encourage all our customers to be using GOV.UK One Login as soon as possible, as it is our intention to phase out the Government Gateway by summer 2026.

# CPH TRANSITION

## Encouraging keepers to “Transition their CPH” to the newer livestock movement rules

As Wales moves towards a more modern and robust, traceability system, it is now more important than ever that the land and location data we hold for keepers is accurate and up to date.

By transitioning now, keepers will not only benefit from the simplified CPH rules but will also ensure your records are correct helping to strengthen Wales's national traceability framework for the future.

# EID CYMRU: IMPORTANT CHANGES FOR CATTLE KEEPERS



Later this year, we are planning to transfer all cattle registrations and movement reporting currently managed by the British Cattle Movements Service (BCMS) and the Cattle Tracing System (CTS) to EIDCymru. This means that all cattle records linked to Welsh holdings will move to EIDCymru, creating a single, streamlined multi-species livestock database for Wales.

We are writing out to all cattle keepers regarding the upcoming reporting changes and to ensure a smooth transition, we kindly ask you to log in to your CTS account, review your contact details, holding information, and cattle records. If anything is wrong or out of date, please update it as soon as possible..

Over the coming months, we'll share more details about:

- ✓ How cattle registration and movement reporting will work on EIDCymru
- ✓ What changes keepers can expect
- ✓ How to get started with the new system

After cattle reporting has completely switched over to EIDCymru, we'll let you know the updated timings for when Bovine EID will be introduced in Wales.

In the meantime, please continue to report your cattle registrations and movements through BCMS.

# WOODLAND CREATION

## Woodland Creation: updates and opportunities for 2026

Applications for Woodland Creation support opened again on **2 March 2026**, giving farmers across Wales a renewed opportunity to bring forward tree planting proposals that work for their businesses. The changes introduced for 2026 are designed to make woodland creation simpler, more flexible and better aligned with practical farm realities, while continuing to deliver important environmental benefits for the long term.



A major improvement for this year is the introduction of **new water related capital items**, which include infrastructure such as troughs, piping and water gates to support riparian planting. This will enhance biodiversity

and help protect watercourses from negative climate change impacts such as increased temperatures. It will also provide a valuable buffer from agricultural operations to improve water quality.

Payment rates across Woodland Creation schemes will also increase following the 2026 review. Alongside these uplifted rates, landowners will be eligible for an **additional £825/Ha incentive** for certain native broadleaf planting which is completed within the first three years of the Sustainable Farming Scheme. This approach is intended to encourage early take up of planting opportunities.

A further change is the increased **contract length** of our Woodland Creation Grant Scheme to allow **up to two years** to complete larger scale planting. This approach offers flexibility for those navigating seasonal factors, contractor availability or supply chain challenges.

Together, these updates aim to make woodland creation both accessible and achievable for farm businesses. By offering clarity, improved support and greater delivery flexibility, the 2026 package is designed to help farmers make confident decisions about integrating trees on their land.

# NO NEW AGRICULTURAL WAGES ORDER ON 1 APRIL 2026

From 1 April 2026, the minimum wage levels set out in the Agricultural Wages (Wales) Order 2025 will continue to apply, except where overtaken by changes to the National Minimum Wage (NMW) or National Living Wage (NLW).

As these are minimum rates, any planned or expected annual wage increases can still take place from this date voluntarily. New Agricultural Minimum Wage rates will be considered as soon as it is possible to do so. It is possible a future Wages Order could consider backdated payments for agricultural workers.

## What this means for workers and employers

- ✓ Workers in lower grades (A and B) will see their minimum rates **uplifted automatically to the applicable NMW/NLW**, where these national rates are higher than the existing agricultural minimum wage.
- ✓ For **Grades C to E**, the 2025 rates will remain unchanged. These grades already sit above both the NMW/NLW and the Real Living Wage.
- ✓ Employers may still choose to offer pay increases voluntarily.



## Agricultural Minimum Wage rates

The table below provides a summary of the current statutory rates compared with those that will apply from 1 April 2026.

# ANIMAL HEALTH AND WELFARE

## Ensure your herd is tested for Bovine Viral Diarrhoea before 1 July 2026

Under Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD) legislation, keepers must:

- ✓ screen their herds for Bovine Viral Diarrhoea annually,
- ✓ test to identify PI animals if evidence of BVD is found in the herd
- ✓ isolate Persistently Infected (PI) animals from the rest of the herd for the remainder of their lives.

The BVD screen requires blood samples from five animals, ideally between 9-18 months old per management group. However, if this is not possible speak to your vet for further guidance on which alternative cattle can be tested on your holding. The results of this screen will provide the holding with a BVD status.

From 1 July 2026, herds that have not completed their screening test will be required to pre-movement test animals for BVD before they leave the holding.

### BVD herd status

Every holding will be given a status. The two possible statuses are explained below:

#### BVD negative status

This status is awarded:

- ✓ When all five youngstock in each management group tested as part of the annual screen all have a negative antibody result.
- ✓ When a holding has completed a PI Hunt, all PI animals have been removed, and an application

to change the holding status has been submitted.

#### BVD not negative status

This status is appointed to holdings where either:

- ✓ one or more of the five youngstock screened as part of the annual screen have tested antibody positive.
- ✓ BVD is diagnosed by any other means.
- ✓ the holding's annual screen has expired/not been completed.

Contact your vet to book your BVD test.

### Bluetongue virus serotype 3 vaccination (BTV-3)

Vaccination is the best method of protecting livestock and reducing the impacts of Bluetongue on your farm business. Ordering and administering the vaccine takes time, and the onset of immunity and maximum protection after vaccination typically takes four weeks for sheep and six weeks for cattle. Consider what is best for your herd or flock now, including seeking advice from your vet about the merits and timing of vaccination.
