WELSH FARMERS TO BENEFIT FROM BUREAUCRACY REVIEW

Farmers in Wales will have their voices heard on red tape, as the Minister for Rural Resilience and Sustainability, Llyr Gruffydd, appoints an independent chair to lead a review into the bureaucratic burden on family farms.

- ✓ Welsh Government delivers first of its 100-day manifesto commitments to farming sector.
- ✓ Independent review launched to examine the bureaucratic burden on Welsh farm businesses.
- ✓ Experienced farmer and former NFU Cymru President John Davies appointed to lead the work.

John Davies, a beef and sheep farmer from near Brecon and former President of NFU Cymru, will lead the nine-month review. He will speak directly to those filling out forms – farmers and agents with lived experience of on-farm requirements.

The review will assess the cumulative impact of requirements on farm businesses and examine where there is scope and a need for change.

SUSTAINABLE FARMING SCHEME

Overview

The Universal Layer of the Sustainable Farming Scheme started on 1 January, and you have now applied for either the SFS or BPS on your Single Application Form.

If you applied for SFS, you need to ensure you know which Universal Actions (UAs) apply to your farm business, and that you can meet all requirements by the end of the year.

SFS Universal Layer Dashboard

The SFS Universal Layer Dashboard 2026 is now available on RPW Online.

The Dashboard will confirm the Universal Actions applicable for your farming business and explains the information required to confirm the completion of each Universal Action.

The Dashboard will be updated later in the year to automatically receive confirmation of any Benchmarking or Learning completed with Farming Connect. You will receive broadcast messages through your RPW Online account when these become available to view on the Dashboard.

A “How to Complete” guide for the Dashboard is available on the Welsh Government website.

Progressing your Universal Actions

A full description of what you need to do to meet each Universal Action can be found in the scheme rules book.

Some Universal Actions have requirements which you need to meet at particular times of year, such as habitat maintenance under UA5 or temporary habitat creation under UA6. If you need to create additional temporary habitat under UA6 to meet the scheme requirement for at least 10% habitat on your farm, there are specific establishment dates you must meet depending on which habitat types you choose.

Other Universal Actions are not specific to particular times of the year, and we recommend you spread them out at times when they can provide most value to you such as UA1 Soil testing and UA2 Integrated Pesticide Management assessments.

We recommend livestock farmers contact their vet early to ensure there is sufficient time to complete the Animal Health Improvement Cycle required under UA12.

If you have any queries regarding your ability to complete your UAs, for example you have been informed of long waiting times for your vet or soil testing laboratories, you can contact the RPW Customer Contact Centre. We recommend you start working towards your UAs as early as possible to avoid potential issues.

Your plan to plant: New Tree and Hedgerow Planting Opportunity Plan now available

There are many ways that trees can work for your farm. Whether you're strengthening your hedgerows, planting in field corners, or creating woodlands – trees can provide shade and shelter, enhance landscape character, and create a long-term source of income.

The Tree and Hedgerow Planting Opportunity Plan is now live on RPW Online. It has been designed to help you take a whole-farm view and identify where trees and hedgerows could work best – guided across themes including Food and Fibre Production and Biodiversity.

The plan you create is your proposal for future planting. It's indicative – you won't be expected to plant in every location you map, and it does not give permission to plant. Some areas may not be suitable or eligible for planting, and proposals will need to meet scheme requirements.

You'll need to complete your plan within your first year in the SFS. You must show progress by 31 December 2028, with planting finished by 31 March 2029, including at least 0.1 ha or 250 trees if planted individually. Planting can be done in different ways – as individual trees, small groups, hedgerow trees, or a block – either through a Welsh Government grant or independently.



Full details are set out in the scheme guidance.

Support is available through the SFS, including grants for woodland and hedgerow creation. If using a Welsh Government scheme, apply by 1 November 2028 and receive a Grant Award Letter by 31 December 2028; planting must still be completed by 31 March 2029 to count towards the scheme requirement. Starting early will give you more flexibility, more time to plan, and better access to support.

UA10: Tree and Hedgerow Opportunity Plan

The aim of this Universal Action is to encourage you to consider where tree, woodland or hedgerow planting would benefit your farming business.

There are two distinct requirements of this Universal Action:

- ✓ Complete a Tree and Hedgerow Planting Opportunity Plan on RPW online by 31 December 2026.
- ✓ Demonstrate progress towards implementing your plan by 31 December 2028.

You will need to complete a Tree and Hedgerow Planting Opportunity Plan on RPW Online, regardless of the current area of tree canopy cover or hedgerows on your holding, or the tenure of the land.

Important Reminders

We would like to remind customers that all applicable Universal Actions **must be completed within 2026.**

You will have until 15 January 2027 to ensure your Dashboard information is fully updated.

Please note that balance payments for 2026 will not be processed until all applicable Universal Actions have been completed.

Customers are encouraged to log in, review their Dashboard regularly, and confirm the Universal Actions as they are completed.

SFS Universal Layer Farm inspections

A percentage of SFS Universal farmers will be selected and inspected later this year. Rural Inspectorate Wales (RIW) have introduced a new inspection regime for SFS. Inspectors will engage and arrange a convenient time with farmers, and whilst they need to check the declared farmland and Universal Actions completed at time of inspection, they will also provide support and address any questions farmers may have about the scheme requirements.

Some of these inspections will also include checking elements relevant to the SFS Regulatory Baseline, the vast majority of which form part of Cross Compliance under the Basic Payment Scheme (BPS).

The SFS Regulatory Baseline includes requirements of Livestock Identification and the Control of Agriculture Pollution (CoAP) regulations, which have separate inspection regimes and targets. Engagement and checks for these inspections will continue as set out in the underlying regulations.

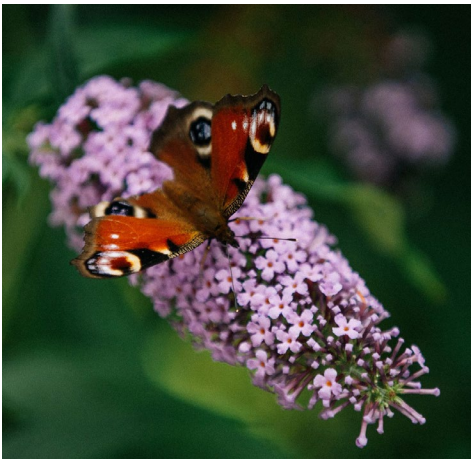

Basic Payment Scheme (BPS) Transition Period

The BPS Transition Period began on 1 January 2026, with the introduction of the Sustainable Farming Scheme (SFS).

Farmers had the option to claim for BPS or SFS on the Single Application Form (SAF) 2026. Once a farm business claims SFS, they cannot claim BPS again.

There are no changes to eligibility criteria and scheme rules during this transition period, however BPS payments will taper over the next 3 years, based on the BPS 2025 entitlement values, as follows:

- ✓ 60% in 2026
- ✓ 40% in 2027
- ✓ 20% in 2028

There will be no BPS available in 2029.

2025 was the final year for the National Reserve and 2-year entitlement usage rule.

Young Farmer Payments are no longer available to new claimants.

Independent Appeals Process for Rural Grants and Payments – Appeal Fee

From 1 January 2026 the fee charged to submit a Stage 2 appeal increased to cover the costs of the Independent Appeal Panel.

The revised appeal fees apply to all Stage 2 appeals submitted from this date, except for those related to TB compensation.

RPW Online – Government Gateway closure

The Government Gateway service was switched off on 30 June 2026. From 1 July 2026 onwards, access to RPW Online is only available through GOV.UK One Login.

The delivery and administration of the Sustainable Farming Scheme in 2026 is dependent on GOV.UK One Login.

All RPW Online customers were invited to migrate from Government Gateway to GOV.UK One Login ahead of the service closure. Customers who have not migrated their account will need to contact the RPW Customer Contact Centre for assistance in obtaining access to their RPW Online account.

Woodland Creation: Opportunities for 2026

Applications for Woodland Creation support are now open and will close on 20 November 2026.

This year, the offer has been updated to be simpler, more flexible, and better aligned with practical farm needs. New capital items are available to support water management alongside planting including troughs, piping and water gates for riparian projects.

Payment rates have also been uplifted for 2026 with an additional incentive of £825/ha available for certain native broadleaf planting completed within the first three years of the Sustainable Farming Scheme.

Delivery contracts under the Woodland Creation Grant Scheme have been extended from one to two years, providing greater flexibility for planning and implementation.

A range of planting options is available to suit different farm systems, including woodland blocks, shelterbelts, and agroforestry. Planting at least 0.1 ha will count towards the Sustainable Farming Scheme's Tree and Hedgerow Planting Opportunity Plan, with agroforestry options available for planting of 250 scattered trees.

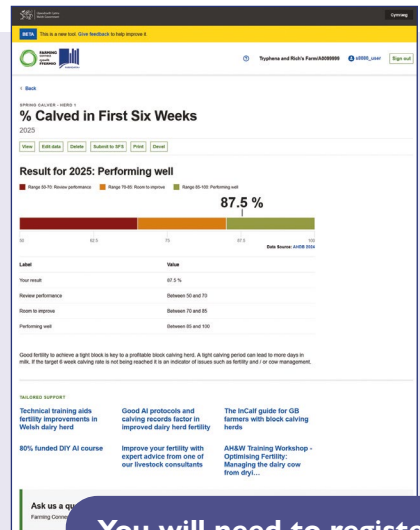

Finance to support the future of Welsh farming

Launching in summer 2026, the Sustainable Agriculture Loan Scheme will help farm businesses across Wales invest in sustainable ways of working.

The aim of the scheme is to provide affordable finance to support the transition to more resilient production and land management.

Key features

- Loans from £25,001 to £1 million
- 3% fixed interest rate
- Up to 15-year repayment terms
- 6-month upfront repayment holiday

Eligible investments

These include energy efficiency and storage, renewable energy generation for on farm use, waste and nutrient management, and farm infrastructure and assets.

Register for a cattle account on EIDCymru today

1 July 2026 marked the start of the transition of cattle services from the British Cattle Movement System (BCMS) and the Cattle Tracing System (CTS) to EIDCymru.

To coincide with the next phase of Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD) legislation in Wales, cattle keepers can now create a cattle account on EIDCymru to access and view the BVD status of their herd and holding online.

Later in 2026, a phased move of keeper records to EIDCymru will begin, allowing the reporting of all cattle births, deaths and movements through the system and service. For now, keepers should continue to use CTS for reporting cattle births, deaths and movements until further notice.

Create a cattle account on EIDCymru to view your BVD status.

To view your BVD status online, you will need to create a cattle account on EIDCymru.

Farmers who already use EIDCymru for sheep and goats will need to register for a separate account for cattle. This arrangement allows existing sheep and goat services to continue without disruption while cattle services transition away from CTS.

- ✓ Your CPH number.
- ✓ Your Herd number.
- ✓ Your Customer Reference Number (CRN).
- ✓ An email address (you can use the same one as your sheep and goat account).

Next phase of BVD eradication now in place — 1 July 2026

Following engagement with the Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD) Eradication Steering Group, new legislation comes into force on 1 July 2026 in Wales.

From 1 July 2026, keepers without a BVD negative herd status will be required to pre-movement virus (antigen) test their cattle to move them off their holding. Animals can only move with a negative result, valid for 60 days. The movement of BVD positive or persistently infected animals off a holding is an offence. This requirement applies regardless of whether the animals will be moving within, or outside of Wales.

Further post-movement virus (antigen) testing requirements are also in force for animals of unknown BVD status

moving onto a Welsh holding from outside of Wales.

Information about your BVD herd and individual animal status can be accessed through EIDCymru, where you can now register for a cattle account.

If you do not use online services, you can contact your vet to find out your herd's BVD status, and arrange screening if needed.



HELP PROTECT WALES FROM THE YELLOW-LEGGED HORNET



The yellow-legged hornet (also called the Asian hornet) is an insect that is not native to the UK. Unlike our native European hornet, it actively targets honey bees and other pollinators.

It was first recorded in France in 2004 and has since spread into other European countries, arriving in England in 2016. In January this year, the first confirmed finding in Wales was recorded near Wrexham and the Animal and Plant Health Agency (APHA) have been carrying out Spring trapping for queens in this area.

Yellow-legged hornets are active from February to November, but you are most likely to see them from July onwards. They can be found on or around:

- ✓ flowering plants (especially ivy in Autumn)
- ✓ beehives, and
- ✓ rotting fruit like fallen apples.

Some of our native insects look similar to yellow-legged hornet. Please use the identification guide to learn how to tell them apart:
