ATISN 27214 – Information requested

- a redacted copy of the terms and conditions of the current or last offer of grant in relation to Welsh Government funding provided to Camp VC and/or VC London Ltd. concerning events held at One Giant Leap, Tan y Craig Farm, Llangollen; and also the total amount of grant funding received by them. You mention that your particular interest relates to what objectives and performance expectations were set out in relation to off road motorbikes / motor vehicles.

Our response

I can confirm that the Welsh Government holds some of the information you have requested.

1. The information relating to funding is exempt from disclosure under Section 43 – commercial interests of the Freedom of Information Act and is therefore withheld. Full reasoning for applying this exemption is included at the bottom of this letter.
2. There are no objective and performance expectations set out in relation to off road motorbikes / motor vehicles in the Welsh Government Grant Award Letter

Engagement of Section 43(2) – Commercial interests

The Welsh Government believes that releasing information relating to funding would be likely to prejudice our commercial interests.

Public interest arguments in favour of disclosure

I recognise the general public interest in openness and transparency and releasing the information would help the public gain a better understanding of the decisions made by Government. It is also recognised that there is a public interest in how public money is to be, or has been, used to ensure that Government gets the best value from the public purse.

Public interest arguments in favour of withholding

The grant recipients receive differing targets, terms and conditions to other grant recipients, based on the information provided in their applications. The terms are not general guidance but individual terms tailored to each recipient. This means they are not suitable for general publication as they are case-specific information, not corporate policy. Release of this information would harm the company's commercial position and it would give competitors an unfair advantage and also prejudice future negotiations.

Grant award letters and terms and conditions include explicit confidentiality provisions, we must protect sensitive operational and financial data.

Release of this information would be likely to prejudice the grant application process undertaken by Welsh Government policy officials in determining whether or not support is a viable option. It would be likely that businesses would be less willing to provide the necessary amount of detail required when following the set process for assessing future business support requests, resulting in the failure of the necessary processes.

I am aware that as a general rule, the sensitivity of information is likely to reduce over time, so that the age of information, or timing of the request may be relevant in determining whether to apply the exemption, or where the public interest may lie. In this case, however, the information captured is very much current information.

In conclusion, I believe that the balance of the public interest therefore falls in favour of withholding the information.
