Have you seen this insect?

The yellow-legged hornet is sometimes called an Asian hornet. It is a type of insect that is not native to the UK. It eats honey bees and other pollinators. This is why we want to stop it from spreading.

A dead yellow-legged hornet nest has been found near Wrexham. We need you to tell us straight away if you see this insect so we can stop it spreading.

Where you might see it.

Yellow-legged hornets are **active from February to November**, but you're most likely to see them from **July onwards**. They like:

- **Flowering plants** (especially ivy in autumn)
- **Beehives**
- **Rotting fruit** like fallen apples

They are not usually aggressive, but they can sting if they feel their nest is in danger. So **never go near a nest**.
